Land Reclamation and Livelihood Options of Lagoon Dependent **Communities in Lagos Nigeria**



Background

Around the world, coastal cities are reclaiming lands and building artificial islands in the ocean due to population squeeze. In Lagos, indiscriminate sand extractions and amorphous construction within urban seascape are partly responsible for the rapid decline or complete loss of native fish species that are vital to local livelihood sustainability.



Scoping study – Methods

- Gather publicly available socio-economic data on lagoon fisheries.



Using Google maps, we are able to detect the extent of lands reclaimed from the Lagoon mostly since 1999 in various parts of Lagos. The growing appetite for dry land means that Lagos is colonizing its vital barrier lagoon much faster than we have witnessed in the previous years creating great concern among environmental development and NGOs' actors.
