We kindly request that you share your insights on the utilization of science diplomacy within your respective countries, regions, or institutions. Specifically, we are interested in understanding the current global and regional trends, as well as emerging developments that could influence the strategic planning and operational activities of the Science Diplomacy Center (SDC). Please include any shifts in global dynamics, regional priorities, emerging challenges, and opportunities that may impact the effectiveness and





scope of the SDC's initiatives. Your experiences and observations are invaluable to us as we navigate the evolving landscape of science diplomacy.

- 2. At the IAI CoP 31 Side Event on Science Diplomacy in June 2023 in Panama, several critical topics were highlighted as priorities: Emerging Technologies for Global Environmental Change (including AI, quantum technology, and blockchain); Climate Disaster Risks and Cascading Effects; One Health or Planetary Health Solutions; Indigenous Knowledge and Migration; Poverty Alleviation, Conservation, and Sustainability. To effectively progress these areas through the Science Diplomacy Center, we are seeking your input on prioritization, identification of cross-cutting issues and potential synergies, as well as strategies for advancement. Could you recommend specific activities or initiatives that could advance these topics? Are there key expert partners or organizations that could be instrumental in addressing these activities? Additionally, what impacts and results do you anticipate could be achieved from focusing on these key topics? Your insights will be crucial in shaping our approach to leveraging science diplomacy to address these emerging issues.
- 3. We kindly request your assistance in identifying one or two strategic partners or institutions in the Americas, especially within the Latin America and Caribbean region, that could significantly contribute to advancing the mission of the Science Diplomacy Center (SDC). This includes, but is not limited to, initiatives related to capacity building, financing, addressing emerging issues, and other relevant endeavors. Your recommendations will be invaluable in helping us establish effective and strategic collaborations and enhance the impact of the SDC's efforts.
- 4. Can you identify the strengths and weaknesses, as well as the pros and cons, of the SDC? Your recommendations are essential for developing strategies to foresee and address any weaknesses or challenges and to leverage the strengths to enhance the effectiveness of the SDC's operations. The SDC summary report and presentation on day 1 will be useful for this discussion.
- 5. What lessons can be obtained from other centers, programs, and science diplomacy initiatives, or country experiences in science-policy and international collaborations? How can we effectively integrate these lessons into our practices to optimize the functioning and impact of the work of the SDC, also considering the strengths and weaknesses?
